






Varvara Roza Galleries and K. Nichols Contemporary are pleased to co-present 'Release' by Amanda Watt at Gallery Eight, London. Watt's first large-scale solo show in the UK since the 1980s combines her interiors, landscapes and depictions of the female form to create a show that is bold, bright and brave. All painted since returning to her native Northern Ireland after almost thirty years in the USA, the pieces have taken on a new sensitivity and emotional expression.

This latest body of work is an artistic release: an outpouring of energy and emotion that creates an explosion of colour and form. Watt investigates her own personality, experiments with paint and canvas, and trusts her intuition, letting her memory and imagination lead the way. Many of the pieces have a cinematic aspect to them – a one-point perspective that gives the feeling of something filmic, as if Watt is releasing a glimpse into her artistic process.


Inspired by her life in California and Florida, and her subsequent return to Ireland, 'Release' is an epiphany for Watt, a true outflowing of creativity.














The BallroomAcrylic on canvas

Destiny's Move Acrylic on canvas 117 x 107 cm








Martel Avenue Acrylic on canvas 60 x 50 cm









Hockney's View Acrylic on Canvas 100 x 150 cm




Moving Day Acrylic on Canvas 100 x 150 cm

My 'Fragmented Memories' draw techniques and ideas from across modern art. The bright colours and flattening of the picture planes amplify the expressive power of each piece, while shouting about the vitality of life. The clean lines of geometric abstraction compartmentalise different memories, thoughts, objects and motifs. While each part has its own meaning, my aim is to combine them to create a balanced whole.





Bliss Acrylic on Canvas 50 x 70 cm


Love Knows No Bounds Acrylic on Canvas 40 x 50 cm





About Amanda Watt

A self-confessed 'Fusionist', Amanda Watt pays homage to the past: the multiple perspectives of cubism; the bright energy of expressionism; and the simplicity of primitivism all combine in her unique and highly recognisable style. Her every-day world and that of fantasy collide to create bright and joyful images based on the clarity and simplicity of abstract forms.

Amanda Watt was born in Northern Ireland and graduated from the Belfast College of Art and Design in 1982. After three years in London, she was given an opportunity by one of her collectors to move to Los Angeles, where she spent the next twenty years building a successful career as an artist. With annual solo shows in LA, San Francisco and New York, Amanda's bright, vibrant interior scenes and semi-abstract figurative and landscape paintings became a staple of Californian society. Watt's key collectors include casino mogul Steve Wynn, award-winning film director Barry Levinson, Cultural Ambassador Vanessa Branson, former president of Ireland Mary Robinson, and fashion-designer Marla Ginsburg.

Amanda plays with the fusion of East and West and of genres and styles from the early twentieth-century to the present day. She is inspired by Gauguin's Orientalism and Japanese woodblock prints, which she combines with western cubist principles and the expressionists' use of colour. She cites the pattern-making of Gustav Klimt and the highly stylised figures of Tom Wesselman and Alex Katz as influences, as well as Rainer Fetting's use of bold colour and gestural brushstrokes. The bright Californian colours of David Hockney and the decisive curves of Matisse are clearly recognisable in her work.

Working exclusively with acrylic paint allows Watt a fast pace of work with spontaneous gestures, transparent washes and a great depth and vibrancy. Motifs from memory and imagination are peppered throughout her work: highly stylised furniture; a picture within a picture; a torso – fragmented parts that come together to create a satisfying balance.
